

**Chairman's Report for Annual General Meeting of Waitara Alive, September 24, 2018, 5.30pm
Waitara Alive office.**

Welcome all

This report pertains to our 2017 year of operations and is somewhat overdue; I apologise for the delay.

2017 was a busy year for the Waitara Alive project. Our Community Development Advisor, and sole full time employee, Vicky Dombroski, will report on the projects and undertakings she has been involved in during the 2017 year.

The challenges have been many; however it is my firm belief that Waitara Alive has played a huge part in lifting the positive profile of Waitara among our own citizens and to the wider audience.

I believe the statistics reported by Vicky regarding positive media versus negative reports are an indication of Waitara taking pride in itself and moving forward. I hope it continues; certainly the signs are positive - for example the Clifton Park project.

2017 saw change in the Board of Waitara Alive; Our Board has been stable, however it has sometimes been a struggle to coordinate everyone's schedule for meetings and so we have recently changed the frequency of meetings to alternate monthly and appointed a small group to meet with our CDA in between in a consultative support role.

Two new Board members have been inducted onto the board and one of them has been elected to Acting Chair in the absence of myself, due to resignation. The new board members are Brent Abbot from Tandem Group and Tracey Bryant from WISE better Homes, Tracey is also the acting chair up to and including the Waitara Alive AGM 2018

We now have a number of vacancies for board positions and I look forward to others stepping up and doing their bit to enhance the Waitara and districts community.

Waitara Alive is utterly dependent on community funding for our operations. We (and our community) have relied on the Taranaki Electricity Trust for a number of years. Our CDA and I have met with our local North Taranaki ward TET Trustees Ken Bedford, Karen Schumacher, and Mike Davey during the year and keep them abreast with our various projects.

The TET contributions fund our administration operations – basically salary, rent, transport. Any extra projects require their own funding sources and involve a lot of our CDA's time and effort – which is a risk to delivery of our purpose given our limited staffing levels.

We are investigating further options for projects and funding in line with our stated objective of positively "Growing our Community". Our challenge is to grow delivery hand in hand with funding, whether it is from a degree of commercializing some of our activities (whilst maintaining our charitable status) or specific projects funded project by project. It is a real challenge for us.

In closing I acknowledge my fellow Board members for their contributions over the year and ongoing.

I acknowledge the Taranaki Electricity Trust for their ongoing support and particularly our local trustees.

I also most want to acknowledge and thank Vicky Dombroski for her service and delivery as our sole full time employee. The role of Community Development Advisor It is not an easy position – it is sometimes isolated and the needs of our community are many, as are the opportunities.

But they all require time, funding, commitment and capability. In Vicky we have 2 of those requirements in abundance. Funding and time are a challenge so focus on best outcomes and “bang for buck” is a constant.
